Amal Shoeib Sets Defense Date and Has Accepted Manuscript



Graduate student Amal Shoeib (mentor: Paul Prather, PhD) will defend her PhD dissertation titled "Characterization of non-canonical cannabinoid receptors in cancer cells: Implications for drug development" on Friday, October 1st @ 9:00 a.m. Amal received her undergraduate degree in pharmacy and pharmaceutical sciences from Misr International University in Egypt in 2008. She received her master's degree from Mansoura University, also in Egypt, in 2016.

Additionally, Amal had a first-author manuscript titled "Characterization of cannabinoid receptors expressed in Ewing Sarcoma TC-71 cells as potential targets for anti-cancer drug development" accepted for publication in

Life Sciences. Dr. Prather, assistant professor Shengyu Mu, and graduate student Lance Benson are co-authors on the paper. The manuscript identifies and characterizes cannabinoid receptors expressed in Ewing Sarcoma, which is an aggressive bone tumor in children and young adults with few therapeutic options that are associated with severe adverse effects.
